Actor: 'Round about the 1870s, most of the easy oil had been removed from the ground in Oil Springs and Petrolia. So a highly skilled driller started travelling abroad, opening up oil fields all over the world. One of the first to go overseas was William McGarvey.

Actor: William McGarvey ran a successful store in Petrolia and owned an oilfield with 18 producing wells. He served as the town's first reeve, and later mayor, and even dabbled in provincial politics. Nearly 40 years old, he'd already lived a full life but when John Bergheim, a petroleum engineer, invited McGarvey to Germany to explore some potential fields, he jumped at the chance. They didn't find much oil there so they looked further east, in Galicia, in what was then the Austro-Hungarian Empire. Others had tried and failed to get oil out of the ground but McGarvey brought in some Lambton Hard Oilers and used the tried-and-true pole-drilling methods, and they struck oil.

Actor: In 1881, McGarvey sent for his wife and children. The family lived comfortably in a castle near the Galician oil fields and had a residence in Vienna as well. The McGarveys became enormously wealthy and lived like royalty, becoming an important part of Austrian upper society. William's youngest daughter, Mamie, married a royal, Count Ebert von Zeppelin in one of the grandest wedding ceremonies ever seen in Vienna. For a wedding gift, McGarvey gave Mamie a silverware set and a castle on a 700-acre estate to keep the silverware safe.

Actor: McGarvey's company grew to encompass oil fields and refineries all over Europe and beyond, serving the world's ever-increasing thirst for oil. Ironically, the very oil he helped to bring out of the ground would fuel the first great mechanized conflict, World War I. Many of his Galician oil fields were set on fire in the ravages of war. His empire crumbled around him. Heartbroken, he died in 1914, never to see Canada again.
